# ARPA –New Hampshire's Discretionary Funds Feedback Survey Results

Detailed Data Summary

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### **Executive Summary**

The New Hampshire (NH) Department of Health and Human Services (DHHS) Bureau of Child Development and Head Start Collaboration (BCDHSC) received a one-time investment of \$77 million under the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). The funds are divided into two distinct programs: Stabilization (\$47 million), which must be used to continue to stabilize the industry, and Discretionary (\$29 million), which is intended to rebuild the system stronger than it was pre-pandemic. The \$29 million in Discretionary funds must be committed by September 30, 2023 and must be spent by September 30, 2024. These funds also have an outcome based focus with the intent to build capacity, strengthen the workforce, create dependability for parents, match supply and demand, and improve quality. At this time guidance from the Administration for Children and Families Office of Child Care has not yet be released.

Between July 23, 2021 and August 31, 2021 NH DHHS BCDHSC conducted a survey in which stakeholders had the opportunity to provide input on the use of the ARPA Discretionary Funds (<u>Appendix</u>).

Almost 430 surveys were completed from over 56 organizations, entities, and individuals. The top organizations represented included licensed, non-profit, early child care center/program, and for profit. Of note 25 community service providers responded and 23 parents and/or guardians responded to the survey. All 10 New Hampshire counties were represented with Hillsborough County having the most respondents (101). Respondents also had the opportunity to identify what types of regional or local collaboratives, networks or coalitions they participated in. Only 34.22% (141) reported being a member of a regional or local collaborative, network or coalition. Of those who responded "yes" the top represented groups include State Early Learning Alliance (SELA) (16), Across NH (13), NH Association for the Education of Young Children (13), Child Care Aware NH (11), and Early Learning NH (10).

Within the survey respondents were asked to indicate which areas they saw as critical to building back child care stronger and meeting the goals of the ARPA Discretionary funding for NH. Areas were first broken into the following categories: workforce, providers, family and children, Head Start and Early Head Start, Regional Networks and Collaboration, and Business/Employers. Within those categories respondents identified if specific recommendations were a high priority, moderate priority, low priority or not a priority at this time. Based on the responses these are the top three recommendations stakeholders believe are the highest priority, all of which fall within the workforce category. The top priority was "explore wage and benefit increase options". The second priority was "explore recruit and retain incentives including bonuses, help with background check costs, etc." The third overall priority was "offer educational and professional development supports such as college and technical tuition, CDA, apprenticeships". As mentioned above there were 6 total categories included in the survey. These are the top priorities within each of the 6 categories: "explore wage and benefit increase options" (workforce), "provide grants and guidance for expansion/new programs in areas with low income and/low supply" (providers), "increase equity and access through tuition cost assistance" (families and children), "expand programming and opportunities with partnerships" (Head Start/Early Head Start), "leverage existing work and support work of 7 PDG networks" (Regional Networks and Collaboration), and "link business and child care through initiatives, grants and partnerships" (Businesses/Employers).

The next steps are to convene a small but diverse short-term committee to review the survey data and identify their final top 3 recommendations for the use of the ARPA Discretionary Funds.

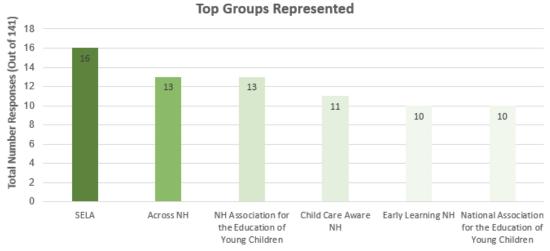

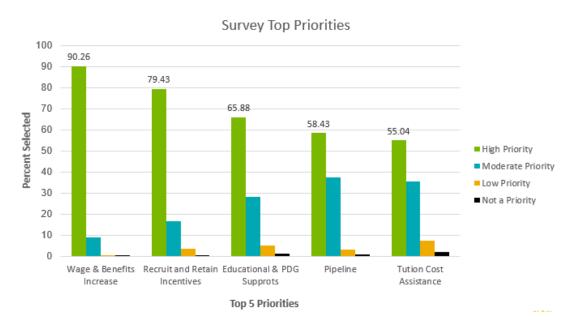
